#### **VSRA Expands Headquarters & Training Capacity**

Due to an increase in training and event participation, VSRA identified a need to expand its offices to best serve its Membership. In May 2019, VSRA moved into new headquarters located inside Downtown Norfolk's World Trade Center. Along with expanded offices and storage, this new space features two large, 40+ person capacity classrooms and state-of-the-art technology. The expansion has already proved beneficial, as VSRA has hosted more than 730 students in classroom training since moving to the new space. When the schedule allows, this space is available for meetings and offsites without a facility use charge, adding another benefit for VSRA's dedicated Member Companies.



## **VSRA Hosts Open House & First Ever Networking Social**

In June, VSRA opened the doors to the new office during its first annual evening networking social and open house. More than 200 VSRA Members, community partners, and Navy representatives attended the event.

## Foundation's Workforce Development Partnerships Lead to Funding, Awards

The Virginia Ship Repair Foundation had a banner year in 2019, partnering with many community organizations and educational entities to develop innovative programs to bring high-quality, highly-skilled workers into the Ship Repair industry. An additional \$500,000 in funding was included in the Governor's Budget Proposal, which would provide two more years of funds to the Marine Trade Training Program. This will allow expansion of capacity and capabilities, including development of Level 2 courses to create training pathways for entry-level workers.

The Foundation's work with the Academies of Hampton Maritime Academy led to recognition as the Commonwealth's Business / Industry Partner of the Year, an Award accepted by VSRF Chair Dawn Angrisani at an awards banquet in Richmond in July. The Foundation-led Maritime Academy was also named Advisory of the Year by the City of Hampton and received special recognition from Hampton City Schools Superintendent Dr. Jeffrey Smith and City Manager Mary Bunting for their excellent support of the Maritime program.

In a revolutionary partnership with the Hampton Roads Workforce Council (HRWC), WHRO, Tidewater Community College, and the United Way, the Foundation was a key partner in a \$500,000 Department of Labor grant awarded to HRWC. The grant will develop the Women in Skilled Careers (WISC) program, which will provide soft-skills and technical training to women with the goal of attaining entry-level careers in the Ship Repair industry. Many VSRA Member Companies have signed-on as supporters of the WISC initiative, guaranteeing interviews to participants who complete the program.

Overall, the Foundation reached more than 18,000 students, parents, teachers, administrators, and community members in 2019 – a record number that nearly doubles the number of students reached just two years ago. The extraordinary efforts of the Virginia Ship Repair Foundation are proving that Virginia's Ship Repairers don't just talk ship, they make ship happen.

### **Tradesperson of the Year Awards**

The VSRF's annual Tradesperson of the Year Awards highlight excellence in the Ship Repair workforce. In 2019, awards were presented to Senior Tradesperson of the Year Dirk Parker of Newport News Shipbuilding and Junior Tradesperson of the Year Axel Leon of BAE Systems Norfolk Ship Repair. Also recognized from the 19 nominees were Senior Runner-Up Elvis Vera and Junior Runner-Up Paul Flory, both from Oceaneering International. Throughout the year, these individuals served as excellent ambassadors for the Ship Repair industry. In addition to attending the Surface Warrior Ball and Ship Repair Race Night, they provided testimonial videos and starred in the annual VSRA holiday greeting message. These videos air on television and digital advertising throughout Virginia.
